SIXTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

Peace to all of you!

We celebrate this Sunday the sixth Sunday in Ordinary Time. During this time of pandemic, we are experiencing how difficult to us is to be isolated from each other. More than ever, we all struggle to be alone and to feel lonely. In today's Gospel, there is a leper, somebody who is far away from God and the others, somebody who has sinned who asked Christ to heal him. When we fall into sin (could be impatience, anger, criticism, etc), we distance ourselves from God and from others. We feel isolated from the others. When Christ heals us and forgives us, He restores our relationship with God and with others. From then on, we do not feel lonely, we feel connected with God and with the others. This type of healing is the one that Christ wants to make in our lives: to live at peace and in communion with God and with each other.

This coming Wednesday is Ash Wednesday, the beginning of the season of Lent. In Ash Wednesday and during Lent, we are called to repent and to pray, fast and do almsgiving. It is a time of grace and renewal. Sometimes, we have misunderstood lent as a sad period in which I need to change my life and I must get out of sin. This is part of it but not the whole story. This is a time of grace in which Christ shows us His mercy and love in front of our sins and failures. As a consequence of his great compassion for us, we want to break away from sin and we are open to be transformed by his grace. Therefore, during Lent, Christ wants to transform us and renew us, to give us a new heart that can love the others. We fast, pray and do almsgiving as a sign that we want to leave sin behind and we are open to God's grace to transform us through His Holy Spirit. When we pray is to make us aware that we need God's grace in order to be renewed. When we fast, we recognize that our lives are dependant on God's providence. When we do almsgiving, we realize that our lives are connected with the good of the others and not my own good. Let us allow in this time of hope for the Lord to renew our hearts through the gift of the Holy Spirit.

Pope Francis Homily, Sixth Sunday in Ordinary Time

Today's Gospel passage (cf. Mk 1:40-45) presents to us the healing of a man afflicted with leprosy, a disease that in the Old Testament was considered a grave impurity and required the leper to be separated from the community: they lived in isolation. His condition was truly pitiful, because the mind-set of the time made him feel unclean even before God, and not only before mankind. Even before God. Therefore the leper of the Gospel beseeches Jesus with these words: "If you will, you can make me clean" (v. 40).

The most shocking fact is that Jesus touches the leper, because that was absolutely prohibited by Mosaic law. Touching a leper meant being infected even inside, in the spirit, that is, becoming unclean. But in this case the

influence flows not from the leper to Jesus so as to transfer the contagion, but actually from Jesus to the leper so as to grant him purification. In this healing, apart from Jesus' compassion and mercy, we admire his audacity. He is concerned neither about the contagion nor about the rules, but is moved only by the will to free that man from the curse that burdens him.

Brothers and sisters, no disease is a cause of impurity: disease certainly involves the whole person, but in no way does it impair or impede his or her relationship with God. On the contrary, a sick person can be even more united with God. Instead, sin: that yes, is what makes us unclean! Selfishness, arrogance, entering the world of corruption: these are diseases of the heart from which we need to be purified by turning to Jesus like the leper: "If you will, you can make me clean!".

Pope Francis. Homily on Ash Wednesday

We begin the Lenten Season by receiving ashes: "You are dust, and to dust you shall return (cf. Gen 3:19). The dust sprinkled on our heads brings us back to earth; it reminds us that we are dust and to dust we shall return. We are weak, frail and mortal. Centuries and millennia pass and we come and go; before the immensity of galaxies and space, we are nothing. We are dust in the universe. Yet we are dust loved by God. It pleased the Lord to gather that dust in his hands and to breathe into it the breath of life (cf. Gen 2:7). We are thus a dust that is precious, destined for eternal life. We are the dust of the earth, upon which God has poured out his heaven, the dust that contains his dreams. We are God's hope, his treasure and his glory.

Ashes are thus a reminder of the direction of our existence: a passage from dust to life. We are dust, earth, clay, but if we allow ourselves to be shaped by the hands of God, we become something wondrous. More often than not, though, especially at times of difficulty and loneliness, we only see our dust! But the Lord encourages us: in his eyes, our littleness is of infinite value. So let us take heart: we were born to be loved; we were born to be children of God.

Dear brothers and sisters, may we keep this in mind as we begin this Lenten season. For Lent is not a time for useless sermons, but for recognizing that our lowly ashes are loved by God. It is a time of grace, a time for letting God gaze upon us with love and in this way change our lives. We were put in this world to go from ashes to life. So let us not turn our hopes and God's dream for us into powder and ashes. Let us not grow resigned. You may ask: "How can I trust? The world is falling to pieces, fear is growing, there is so much malice all around us, society is becoming less and less Christian..." Don't you believe that God can transform our dust into glory?

PENANCE IN LENT

Fridays in the Lenten Season are days of penance, when small sacrifices are encouraged. Abstaining from meat on Fridays has become a customary Lenten penance for Catholics. The Canadian Bishops have recommended that this penitential practice continue among the faithful, but also stated that other acts of penance may be substituted, such as special prayers or acts of service for others.

Ash Wednesday and Good Friday are days of obligatory fasting and abstinence from meat. "The law of fasting prescribes that only one meal be taken in a day; but it does not forbid taking some nourishment in the morning and evening" (Letters & Legislation, Archdiocese of Toronto). The law of fasting binds those from 18 to 59 years of age, while the law of abstinence from meat binds Catholics who are 14 years of age and older, but every person, regardless of age, can participate in fasting and abstaining from meat if they wish, as long as one's health will allow it.

Parents and educators are reminded of their duty to introduce children gradually to the understanding and practice of penance, including fasting and abstinence, in the life of Catholics. Adult example will be the greatest influence in this matter (Guidelines for Pastoral Liturgy, 1999-2000, CCCB).


