Message from the Pastor

Peace to all of you!

Today we celebrate the Solemnity of Christ the King. The First Reading, from the Book of the prophet Ezekiel, presents a beautiful passage in which God is portrayed as the Good Shepherd who takes care of His people. At that time, Israel was on the exile of Babylon, and they were suffering greatly because of their rebelliousness. However, God promises to look after them, to heal them and to bring them back to their own land. Jesus Christ is the One who has brought to fulfillment this prophecy. He is the Good Shepherd who has come to give His life for us so that we may live to the fullest. Let us find hope in the fact that we have someone who cares so much for us. The Second Reading, from the First Letter of St. Paul to the Corinthians, proclaims the essential fact that in Christ Risen we share in the hope of the Resurrection. All of us experience the power of sin, sickness, and problems. However, through His Death and Resurrection, Christ has shown that He is stronger than sin and death. He has defeated death through His Resurrection and He makes us sharers in living a new life. What normally takes away our peace, now with God's grace we can overcome. The Gospel, from St. Matthew, brings us the parable which portrays the last judgement. There are those who have served and loved their brothers and sisters in a practical way. Whereas there are those who have not even recognized the needs of those around them. This parable helps us to see that the most important aspect of our lives is the love we show to those around us. To love, first we need to receive love from Christ. It is essential to be aware of how much Christ has loved us. With this in mind, our eyes are open to recognize the needs of those around us and with the strength of Christ, we can love them as we have been loved. This is what fulfills our life and gives real meaning to every moment of our existence. On the contrary, when we are caught up in our pride in our own needs, then we cannot love others, we remain empty. Let us ask the Lord that in this feast of Christ the King we can recognize that He is the One who reigns by loving unconditionally and that He may bring us to love others in the same way!

Pope Francis' Homily for the Solemnity of Christ the King (November 22, 2020)

We have just heard the page of Matthew's Gospel that comes immediately before the account of Christ's Passion. Before pouring out his love for us on the cross, Jesus shares his final wishes. He tells us that the good we do to one of our least brothers and sisters - whether hungry or thirsty, a stranger, in need, sick or in prison we do to him (cf. Mt 25:37-40). In this way, the Lord gives us his "gift list" for the eternal wedding feast he will share with us in heaven. Those gifts are the works of mercy that make our life eternal. Each of us can ask: Do I put these works into practice? Do I do anything for someone in need? Or do I do good only for my loved ones and my friends? Do I help someone who cannot give anything back to me? Am I the friend of a poor person? And there are many other similar questions we can ask ourselves. "There I am", Jesus says to you, "I am waiting for you there, where you least think and perhaps may not even want to look: there, in the poor". I am there, where the dominant thought, according to which life is going well if it goes well for me, does not find interesting. I am there. Jesus also says these words to you, young people, as you strive to realize your dreams in life.

I am there. Jesus spoke these words centuries ago, to a young soldier. He was eighteen years old and not yet baptized. One day he saw a poor man who was begging people for help but received none, since "everyone walked by". That young man, "seeing that others were not moved to compassion, understood that the poor person was there for him. However, he had nothing with him, only his uniform. He cut his cloak in two and gave half to the poor person and was met with mocking laughter from some of the bystanders. The following night he had a dream: he saw Jesus, wearing the half of the cloak he had wrapped around the poor person, and he heard him say: 'Martin, you covered me with this cloak'" (cf. Sulpicius Severus, Vita Martini, III). Saint Martin was that young man. He had that dream because, without knowing it, he had acted like the righteous in today's Gospel.

The Advent Season begins next week

The Catholic Church Liturgical Year starts with the 1st Sunday of Advent on December 3, 2023 Advent is a time of preparation for the coming of Christ at Christmas. Latin "adventus" (Preparation) Marks the four Sundays before Christmas

Advent Wreaths

Part of our spiritual preparation for Christmas. Christ is "the Light that came into the world" to dispel the darkness of sin and to radiate the truth and love of God (John 3:19-21). • The wreath is made of various evergreens, signifying continuous life.

 \cdot The circle of the wreath, which has no beginning or end, symbolizes the everlasting life found in Christ.

• The four candles represent the four weeks of Advent. The purple candles symbolize the prayer, penance, and preparatory sacrifices and goods works undertaken at this time.

The rose candle is lit on the third Sunday which is called Gaudete Sunday. It is the Sunday of rejoicing, because the faithful have arrived at the midpoint of Advent, when their preparation is now half over, and they are close to Christmas.

• Only one purple candle is lit during the first week, two in the second week, three (incl. the pink one) in the third week, and all four during the fourth week of Advent The gradually increasing light symbolizes the approach of Christmas, the birth of Jesus, the light of the world. \cdot A fifth candle (white) can be added in the middle of the wreath for Christmas

Eve and Day (or replace all four purple and pink candles with white ones) symbolizing the arrival of Christ, the light of the world. Light the white candle(s) until The Baptism of the Lord.



Families are encouraged to observe Advent by gathering around a wreath for brief Advent prayers and readings lighting the appropriate number of candles for each week.

Traditions assign specific symbolism to each

of the candles:

- 1) The Prophet's Candle, symbolizing Hope
- 2) The Bethlehem Candle, symbolizing Love & Faith
- 3) The Shepherd's Candle, symbolizing Joy
- 4) The Angel's Candle, symbolizing Peace.
